### Letter from the Executive Director



Friends,

Despite the continuing impact of COVID, COSLI students have forged forward-continuing to improve our state, one kid at a time. Recently, I gave in to the 10-year challenge and began to peruse my gallery of photos over the past decade. Doing so, I realized the first conversation about Colorado's governor's school was held in the fall of 2012--we are almost at our first ten-year anniversary. My photos are a veritable documentation of these formative--leading into stabilizing--years and it is quite an album to see.

While we are meeting the expectations for percentage of students remaining in-state for college and career, a number of our students are doing amazing things across the globe, from China to Colorado's Eastern Plains. I received a note from a parent whose child was part of the class of 2019. He wanted me to know how much of a life capstone COSLI was for his daughter. What a compliment for all who are part of our team. The work we do addresses a glaring gap for our best and brightest--filling them with opportunities that go so far beyond what they might experience in traditional schooling, pushing some to do things that they had thought were unattainable before. As I said last year, we are creating important citizens in all fields of study--a tipping point for so many.

As always, we ask for your advocacy and contributions, whether time, treasure, or talent. This year, I began a 3-year term as President of the National Conference of Governor's Schools. Part of what I hope to do during my tenure is advocate for all states to have a governor's school--it is hard but worthy work.

### 2021 Year in Review


#### 2021 By the Numbers




#### In Other News...
